From the Pastor ...

Dear friends,

Sunday in worship, we had the wonderful opportunity to hear Rev. Dr. Brian Blount, President of Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond (my alma mater!). His sermon, based on Revelation 22:1-5 was inspiring, to say the least. If you missed it, or would like to hear it again, it will soon be available by podcast and text through our website, <u>www.firstpre-durham.org</u>.

The power of his sermon is in his pairing of the questions "Why?" and "Why not?" He points out that though many in the early Christian persecuted church cried out "Why?", John of Patmos in the book of Revelation ends not with that question of despair, but with the transformative, inspiring question of hope. Brian said:

It is any wonder, given everything that was happening to John, given everything that John was seeing happen to his people and the churches they worshipped in and the faith they believed in, that John lifted his eyes to the heavens and cried out, "why, Lord? Why?" Rev. 6:9: "How long, Lord, before you stand up for your people?" He is asking, Why? Is it any wonder, given everything that seems to be happening to us today, that even many contemporary Christians lift their eyes to the heavens and cry out, "why, Lord? Why?" But John's book does not end with "why?" John's book ends with "why not?" Despite everything that he sees with his eyes, having been transported in the spirit into God's intent for our world, John perceives with his faith a reality that, given all that was happening in his world, can only be described as a dream.

In our world today, we have a choice. We can face the world and the darkness of the world with despair and cry to God, "Why?" Or, we can face the darkness we see in the world with faith in the light of Christ, which leads to hope, which leads to our actively living out the gospel message in our lives as we share the light of Christ with the world. Brian ended his sermon in this way:

Some people see such darkness in our world, perpetuated by people consumed with hate for themselves and for the people around them, and they ask "Why?" I dream of God's light breaking in so fearlessly and so endlessly that we see each other as God sees us and we love each other the way God loves us, and I ask "Why not?" Why not? There is no reason why not? Unless we who know better refuse to stand up, demand better, and do better. What that great dreamer, Martin Luther King, Jr. declared about his own time still applies to our time: "we will have to repent in this generation not merely for the vitriolic words and actions of the bad people but for the appalling silence of the good people." Good people, do not go gentle into this dark night. Rage. Dream. Of God's light. Be God's light.

May we live in to this call as the people of God at First Presbyterian Church:

Stand up! Demand better! Do better!

Rage! DREAM!

Be God's light, friends. Let us be God's light.

From your Finance and Investment Committee

We had some very good questions asked at the Congregational Meeting on March 19. Here are two questions on which we promised some follow-up.

1. What are the **fees for the Investment Portfolio** now managed by U.S. Trust?

The U.S. Trust fee is all-inclusive and bundled, providing FPC with a transparent pricing structure. U.S. Trust's fee to the First Presbyterian Church is the discounted annual fee of 0.60% based on assets under management. This fee includes investment management, strategic advice, manager selection & monitoring, custody services, and sub-fund accounting services.

2. Why did "**Earnings from Investments**" go down from \$10,769 in 2015 to \$198 in 2016?

Earnings from Investments come from Designated Fund contributions (contributions with donor restrictions for the use of those funds). In 2015 those balances were managed by our previous Investment Manager. During 2016 we were in the transition period between investment managers and the funds were deposited in a money market account. During that period and currently money market accounts pay only a nominal interest rate.
