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From the Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

In our summer newsletters, we have been examining six areas of Christian living: corporate worship, personal devotion, service to the world, stewardship of gifts, fellowship with others, and biblical and theological study. In the last newsletter, we looked at personal devotion. This week, we look at **fellowship** with others.

Recently, I have been asking church members to share three words that describe First Presbyterian Church for them. As different people have shared words, I have noticed overlap in certain areas. The words welcome and hospitality show up often, as do social-justice, justiceseeking, and peacemaking, worship and music. But the one word that shows up 95% of the time is this one: community. Members and friends of FPC feel a strong sense of community in this place. People often comment on how the people of FPC are like a second family to them. They feel welcomed and included in this place. Those who have been around for a long time have seen children grow and develop, go away and come back. Those who are new (like me!) feel welcomed into this family of faith and are quickly invited into fellowship groups and intergenerational events where they get to know one another at a deeper and more personal level. The sooner new members get involved in fellowship opportunities, the sooner they feel a deeper and longer lasting connection with the worshipping community.

We can get to know one another only so well as we sit in the sanctuary together for worship. The places we really get to know one another are the places where we play together, laugh and cry together, work side-by-side, and share meals with one another. The word fellowship in the Christian Church is translated from the Greek word *koinonia*, which can also mean association, community, communion, and joint participation. The more we share our lives together in *koinonia*, the more we are strengthened in our Christian community, our family of faith.

While some believe that coming to worship is enough to be a part of the Christian community, in truth, we grow in our faith and life best when we take the time to fellowship with one another and find the face of Christ in those around us we grow to know and love. May FPC continue to be a place that invites fellowship and nurtures community.

From the Associate Pastor:

The Communion Line

Every Christian Church tradition highly values the importance of the Lord's Supper as sacrament or ordinance in some way. The way in which congregations distribute communion is as varied as the theologies and practices of the underlying traditions of faith. When the *Miglareses* first arrived at First Presbyterian in 2000, this congregation celebrated communion by passing the bread plate and small cup trays filled with the fruit of the vine, all while seated. We were delighted to see a change.

The movement from seated to the formation of a communion line to receive the elements of faith through the method of intinction was established. In this method, we all do not drink from the common cup like in some traditions, but take the bread and dip it into the cup thereby taking the wine/juice and bread at the same time. Yes, the Lord is received as our strength and nourishment no matter what method we use, but I love the communion line.

The communion line is just amazing. It is so because we commune not only with the Lord in this sacred sacramental act but also with one another and that is clearly, visibly experienced in the act of moving from pew to the Table in the presence of one another. Presiding at the Table and observing from the chancel as one of your pastors, gives me an extraordinary glimpse into the assembly of the faithful gathered around the table of the Lord. It is a privileged position. We observe college students, middle-schoolers, children of all ages, the newly married and the recently divorced, same sex couples, the elderly and the young, people of all races and genders, Catholics and Protestants, the sick and suffering, too, and yes, former priests as well.

It seems that the depth and breadth of humanity is represented in that line up for communion. It is so because all of our lives contain stories of hope even in the midst of our fears and concerns for the ones we love most. We process and walk, drawn to the one table together to eat and drink of the body and blood of our Lord. It is all a foretaste of what liturgists call the "heavenly banquet."

I pray that our communion line gets longer and longer so that more can experience the working of God in their lives. I am so grateful to walk with you in the communion line at First Presbyterian Church. Thank you.

Faith Teams of The Religious Coalition for a Nonviolent Durham

Do you feel a call to serve those who live on the edges, the least among us? Is the opportunity to work at the intersection of evidence-based practice and social justice intriguing to you?

Faith Teams are specifically developed to work with people returning from prison. We use an evidence-based practice based in Restorative Justice to substantially reduce the risk of reoffending. We do this by developing friendships that transcend race, class, and background to build the Beloved Community here in Durham.

First Presbyterian is forming a Faith Team to support someone returning from prison to the Durham community. The team will include six volunteers and meet for approximately one year, two times per month.

Urban Ministry of Durham's Food Pantry clients now shop with a volunteer "buddy" using reusable shopping bags, and for every reusable bag clients bring back on subsequent visits, they will get bonus food, which UMD wants to be especially healthy. You can help Urban Ministry of Durham's Food Pantry program in three ways:

1) Donate reusable grocery bags, new or gently used.

2) **Donate healthier foods** such as whole wheat pasta and crackers, low and no-sodium nonperishable foods, cereals without added sugar (oatmeal included), organic foods, sugar free foods, tortilla chips, salsa, coffee, teas, brown rice, spices, herbs, cornmeal, whole wheat flour, unrefined sugar, nuts, raisins and other dried fruit, muffin and pancake mixes (preferably needing just water).

3) **Donate most needed foods**. We have a huge supply of canned vegetables but need canned meat (especially chicken), pasta (dry and canned), pasta sauce, mac & cheese, rice, and shelf-stable milk.

Let's help our neighbors who don't have enough food by bringing items to FPC. The Service and Mission Committee will see that your donations are delivered to the UMD Food Pantry this summer.
