Children's Sunday School - Grades 3-5

We'll look at a new Jesus story this month, the Parable of the Farmer and the Growing Seed from Mark 4: 26-29. Teachers will tell the story, discuss any wonder questions, and spend time with prayer requests on **October 1** (World Communion Sunday). Then on **October 8**, we will spend time in the Spirituality Room and practice a few songs for worship and for the upcoming Christmas Pageant. All are welcome to join this wonderful group of children. **Please make a note that all of you will receive Bibles in worship on Sunday, October 22!**

Faith and Community Class: Did you know that October 2017 marks the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther nailing his 95 theses to the door of the Wittenberg Cathedral? So, we at FPC will be taking time this month to join with those around the world who are celebrating the Protestant Reformation. On **Sunday, October 1**, *Marilyn Hedgpeth* will look back to some of the people, places and practices that influenced the great schism in Christianity prior to Luther. On **Sunday, October 8**, *Mindy Douglas* will lead a discussion of some of the great theological themes of the Reformation which remain with us today, such as justification by faith, sola scriptura, and the priesthood of all believers. And then on **October 16**, *Sam Miglarese* will help us to consider what the Reformation anniversary means for Church unity today and in the future. We hope that you'll bring all of your questions and wonderings and meet in Watts-Hill Hall at 9:45 these Sundays for some lively discussion, and leave humming "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." All are welcome.

Lectionary Class: Join us for discussion at 9:45 in the East Parlor.

For **October 1:** How do we recognize authority? Did Moses act with authority? Did Jesus? Where did they get their authority? Join us for discussion at 9:45 in the East Parlor.

For **October 8:** Paul came to a point where he considered that everything that had defined his early life – the privileges of his ancestry, his zealous devotion to the law - was worthless and could be discarded, because he had found something much better. What defines your life? What could you "regard as rubbish" and leave behind? Join us for discussion at 9:45 in the East Parlor.

Journeys and Scratch/Young Adults Class

At 9:45, Journeys and Scratch combine classes in Room 205 to study the book, *The Road to Character*, by David Brooks. The class is being team taught by members of both classes. All are welcome.

Spiritual Formation This year-round class for women is led by *Susan Dunlap* and explores the topic of spiritual formation. Join us at 9:45 in **basement classroom B-16**.

Fall Bible/Book Study: Cultivating Christian Character

It's not too late to join the Friday morning Bible/Book Study group. We are studying the content of our character as Christians. Have we been created to compete successfully on the economic playing field, or have we been created to practice a life of self-restraint, self-erasure, and self-suspicion, as author David Brooks suggests in his book, *The Road to Character*? Or are we called to embrace the gifts of the Holy Spirit, as enumerated in Galatians 5: 22-23: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control? We'll start with these Christians virtues, and then during Lent, we'll veer over into the classic Christian vices (virtues gone wild!) to see where we stand. Part book study, part Bible study, the class will meet on Friday mornings from 10:30 – noon in Room 205 of the Education Building. All are welcome and invited to participate.
