From the Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

Oh, how our hearts ache at the news of yet another mass murder, this one hitting close to home just as the one in Charleston at Mother Emanuel did. People just like us gathered for worship or study in a place of safety – a sanctuary – and left with death, despair, and untold grief. Oh, how we feel the agony of those violated and victimized by someone with a deep anger and a powerful gun. Just like that, life is lost and lives are changed forever. As we were after the recent massacre in Las Vegas and after the many other mass killings we have endured together, we are also now deeply affected by this news from Texas and send our thoughts and prayers to our siblings who suffer mightily this week.

Our thoughts and prayers, as important as they are, will not change the fact that our nation has lost control of guns, has reduced care for those who suffer from mental illness, and has decreased advocacy and education about mental illness. We have neglected those who are in need, who are susceptible to anger and violence, and who feel unloved and unsupported. We have supported a system that provides high-powered guns to anyone who will work to get them. We must turn our sorrow into anger over unjust systems that allow God's children to be so lost in such darkness that they would take the lives of innocents. We must turn our sorrow in to anger over a powerful gun lobby that will not consider more elements of control and regulation (not to get rid of all guns, but to put checks in place for those who purchase guns and to eliminate the purchase of weapons that are used for mass killings of our children, our parents, our friends, and our neighbors). Then we must turn our anger at these injustices **into action** so that the mentally ill can receive the care they need and so that some regulation will be put into place for those types of guns which are able to kill many people in a short period of time.

Some will say I am getting too political here, because gun control and mental health policy is decided by our government. Maybe I am, but I also cannot sit by and watch while, seemingly every month now, another angry, violent, and vengeful person summarily executes another innocent group of people for various reasons (and for no reason at all). I believe we *do* offer our prayers, our deep prayers. I also believe we *do* trust in God, with all our hearts, and lean upon God's understanding far more than our own. But I also believe God has given us hearts and minds and the ability to make a difference in the lives of people around our nation and even around our world.

I know there will be some who disagree with me, and I invite further conversation and exploration about this. Please email, call, or set up a time to talk about this. I value your opinion and don't expect everyone to agree with me. I also value the opportunity to be in conversation about this and the many other challenges we face as the church in the world.

Please know also that we have been working on a safety plan for about a year now. Several parts of that plan have been put into place and the safety team and staff will soon implement other parts. We have considered and will continue to consider an active shooter response. We have no way of knowing where the next shooting will be and I do not anticipate that this will change our regular patterns of behavior or church attendance, but I do recognize the need to be prepared and hope you know that we have a team at work on this.

In this and all that you are dealing with in your own life, I send love to you from God, our

Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer, and give thanks that our lives are in God's hand, by the power of Jesus Christ, and with the movement of the Holy Spirit. *Sola Deo Gloria*.


