From the Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

Years ago, in an article in *The Christian Century*, I found a story that left me wrapped in the awe and wonder of the season of Advent. The story is by Kathleen Hirsch and it is titled "Advent with a Toddler." I share it with you this week so that as you enter into the season of Advent, with its candles, preparation, waiting, minor keys, and hopeful anticipation of the coming of the Christ child and Christ's coming again to earth, you might think about the moments of wonder in your own life and the way God touches you with simple, honest acts of love and brings you a glimpse of the holy. Enjoy.

I was potting the last of the jam when my son disappeared from the kitchen. I heard rummaging in the living room, then the metallic tinkle of ornaments on the lower boughs. Minutes later he was standing beside me, a solemn three-year-old holding a stuffed red heart that he'd taken from the tree.

"Mommy," he announced. "Pretend that I am Gabriel."

I looked at the chocolate around his lips, the sleeves of his Henley rolled up for wings, and his utterly sincere and serious eyes.

"Kneel down, Mommy," he instructed me.

I obliged. Gabriel and I were face-to-face, inches apart, in front of the stove. "Mary," he addressed me. "You shall have a son. And this," he extended the plush red heart toward my face. "This is your holy."

Here, he paused for emphasis. "You must carry your holy with you always, Mommy—even around your neck—so that Jesus will know that he is holy too." I looked at the heart offering, velvet and gold, resting in my hand. What to do with the hot coals of a prophet?

Then, perhaps overcome by the force of his own inspiration, my Gabriel turned and fled back to the crèche to distribute more of the "holy" to the creatures assembled there.

Slowly I got to my feet. For a moment my son had seen heaven and had offered me a glimpse. Not long out of diapers, he had lanced the literal with the intuition of a sage. Truth's vital core, the beckoning center of everything, is its holiness. Without the holy, life—even simplified, even with terrific gingerbread and jam—is dust. I looked at the heart again. My world doesn't involve a lot of angel sightings, but as I reflected on what had just transpired, I realized that my world didn't leave much room for wonder either. My son was far better attuned to the ways in which the sacred speaks. It comes to us on the wing; it grazes the heart. Only after long contemplation does it coalesce into something that we can put words to. "Lest you become like children, you won't enter the kingdom of heaven," the words rang in my ears.

Keep alert, friends, watch and wait with wonder, and may you find your own holy this Advent season.

SESSION BRIEFS

At its November stated meeting, the FPC Session took action on several motions:

- 1) From the Property Committee: Adopting an Emergency Operations Plan (contact church office for a copy) and approving a Core Emergency Management Team, to assist the church to respond appropriately if emergencies occur at any time--during secular or sacred events, during the day or in the evening, during the work week or on the weekend.
- 2) From the Service and Mission Committee: Approving the establishment of a Refugee Resettlement Account and guidelines for how the money will be distributed; and partnering with the Church of Reconciliation in Chapel Hill to support their offer of sanctuary to immigrants facing immediate deportation.

The Session is grateful to these committees for drafting these plans and helping to move our community forward in these areas.
