From the Associate Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

Durham has changed drastically in the last 10 years, no doubt: a skyscraper, trendy restaurants, DPAC, a parking crunch, and so many apartments. And yet, when we were walking the neighborhood streets as part of our Holy Week observance on Good Friday, the street scene seemed remarkably unchanged to me: cigarette butts and dandelions lining the cracked sidewalks, buses stopping to pick up and discharge riders and their bicycles, people hanging around outside Urban Ministries, cars with speakers blaring - oblivious to the solemn assembly, Amtrak passing at the appointed hour, and the faithful – walking the winding Via Dolorosa through Durham, feeling the heft of the rough hewn cross, sharing its weight with others, reliving the story of Jesus' suffering, praying and singing along the journey. It always moves me.

But what moved me most this year was our shared journey with others. We gathered on Palm Sunday with our neighbors from Trinity UMC and St. Philip's Episcopal to wave palms and to bless each other's churches. We gathered again on Maundy Thursday at Covenant Presbyterian with their members and the members of Beacon of Light Missionary Baptist to wash feet and remember Jesus' last supper and his command to "love one another". And we gathered on Good Friday with the members of St. Philip's, Covenant, and others to follow the old rugged cross and be reminded of the redeeming power of sacrificial love. We are not alone in this venture: that was my take-away from this year's journey to Easter. We are not alone. We are surrounded by saints in the city who walk the Way of Jesus with us, together, side by side. Sometimes it requires taking a walk outside of your building to realize that you are not a lone disciple. Thanks be to God for our brothers and sisters in faith, the beloved community, who are empowered by the Risen Christ to anchor this city in love and faithfulness, as we grow and change together. Happy Eastertide to all the saints!

I concur with *Mary Seawell*, Dorothy's daughter, that FPC is to be commended for the warm and compassionate ways that it wraps caring arms around those in need. Our congregation has grown in this way, and it is a beautiful thing to see.
- The **Friday morning Bible Study** returns to finish our study of "Cultivating Christian Character: the Fruits of the Spirit", taking a look at "gentleness" this Friday, and "self-control" on April 13. We will conclude our study on April 20th with a celebration brunch (at which we will practice self-control!). The class is open to everyone, on Fridays from 10:30 noon at the church. *Marilyn Hedgpeth* leads the class and would love to have you join us as a Lenten practice.
- The **Lenten elective**, *Holy Listening: Poetry Reading and Writing*, which used poetry as a lens for focusing our attention on God, has ended. Anyone is welcome to bring some interesting poems to share, and to join us around the table. *Marilyn Hedgpeth* is the facilitator.


