From the Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

I hope your week is going well and that you are finding ways to make space for devotion and reflection in your daily lives. Such space reminds us that God is present with us and an important part of our day-to-day lives of school, work, retirement, and other activities. Look for God and find the peace, love, joy, and hope that God intends for you.

This week, I want to use this space for FAQs (Frequently Asked Questions), as there are many of the same questions that I hear as I move amongst you all throughout the week and on Sunday. I will address other questions in future newsletters, so let me know what questions you have! We want the congregation to be as informed as possible so that we might discern together how we might seek to serve God in the city of Durham.

FAQs:

Questions related to the apartment upstairs in the office area:

1) I didn't know there was an apartment? How long has it been there and how has it been used in the past?

A) As far as we know, the apartment has been in place since FPC built the "Church House" building in 1923. At that time, the five-room apartment was occupied by the Religious Education Director Aline "Kenzie" McKenzie and the Church Hostess Emma Jones (see Peter Fish's *Downtown by History and by Choice*, p. 102). Since that time, it has been used by staff, Duke Divinity School students and interns, and most recently by FPC member George Kirshmann, who served as security at night and monthly on Sundays. George moved out at the end of July.

2) How will the apartment be used now?

A) The FPC Session (our governing body made up of elected members from the congregation – see photos and descriptions on the foyer bulletin board) will be considering possible ways that the space might be used. The Property Committee invites you to share your ideas regarding how this space might be used by way of proposals (see information in this newsletter) that will be reviewed by the committee and reported back to Session for consideration.

3) How can I see this space?

A) The space can be seen during office hours. Additional work will need to be done on the apartment before it is ready for use again.

4) How big is the space?

A) We don't have exact measurements at this time, but it is somewhere around 630 square feet. It includes a kitchen, dining room, living room space, bedroom and bathroom.

5) I heard something about needing to install a sprinkler system if we have someone living there? Is this the case?

A) Some years ago, we had received information from an inspector that this was the case. However, Chris Brown, our Property Committee chair, contacted the Interim Chief Fire Marshall and learned that because the apartment space has been designated as an apartment from when the Church House was built in 1923, current code would not be applicable to it. Therefore, the apartment may be used for human habitation without requiring a sprinkler system to be installed.

6) Does this make the space unsafe?

A) This is a question the Property Committee and Session will have to address if they consider proposals that will have a person or people living there. There is no external fire escape, though there is a metal window ladder. Currently, the space includes two smoke detectors.

7) Who do I talk to if I have more questions about this space and how it might be used in the future?

Next up: Questions related to the hiring of our new Temporary Associate Pastor for Youth and Their Families, the work of the Strategic Planning Team, and our Walk-in Ministry and Blessing Bag Ministry.



From the Associate Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

Promotion Sunday is this Sunday, and I am thrilled with the wealth of Christian Nurture Opportunities and the wonderful cadre of teachers, leaders, and advisors at First Presbyterian Church this year. Our theme for this year is "Winds of Change," since we have a new Associate Pastor for Youth and their Families, and things already are

beginning to look a little different. But other changes are "in the air" as well. Let me list a few that we will explain more fully **this Sunday at 9:45 in Watts-Hill Hall:**

- 1) We have **six offerings for adult learning** on Sunday mornings, which is pretty amazing!
 - Adult Lectionary unpacking the texts for each Sunday's worship service
 - Faith and Community looking at *Love Letters of Faith* from the likes of MLK, Dorothy Day, the Apostle Paul, and Reinhold Niebuhr
 - **Journeys & Scratch** combining their inter-generational forces to examine *Prophetic Voices* from MLK to Flannery O'Connor and the Belhar Confession.
 - Women's Spiritual Formation a great support system of sharing and prayer for women
 - **Becoming an Anti-Racist Church** an eight-week course on themes of racism, diversity, white privilege and barriers to inclusivity led by FPC's Racial Equity group.
 - The Pleasures of Parenting a time of discussion and support for parents who find raising children in today's world to be an exciting and daunting task.
- 2) **FPC's 3rd 6th grades** will be trying out a new rotation model of Sunday School, which will allow them to experience the foundational stories of the Old Testament in many different ways through drama, art, games, legos, music, cooking, gardening, etc. Should be great fun for the students and for the teaching teams!
- 3) **Confirmation** includes our 7th, 8th and 9th graders this year (plus several youth from Covenant Presbyterian who will be joining us). Each student will pick and adult mentor to make the journey with them. We will visit other communities of faith in the fall and learn how to be good guests. Then in the winter, we will spend some time in the classroom talking about what it means to be a Christian in the Reformed Tradition.

Young and old are invited to join us this Sunday, August 26, for some "windy" activities, some refreshments, lots of fellowship, and time to meet new teachers

and classmates. Teacher/Advisor Dedication and a Blessing of Backpacks will take place during the 11:00 a.m. worship service this Sunday.

New classes begin in earnest on **Sunday, September 2**. The Christian Education Committee has been working hard to harness the winds of the Spirit and make great opportunities available for the whole people of God.
