From the Pastor . . .

Dear friends,

Hello! I hope all of you are coming off of a restful (or perhaps adventure-filled) Labor Day weekend. For many, this weekend is the "last hurrah" of summer before the school-year routine kicks in, though I anticipate the summer heat lingering for quite a bit longer. In worship, we heard from the letter of James (1:17-27) and the exhortation to "be doers of the word and not merely hearers." In the sermon, we considered the "revolutionary labor of love" to which we Christians are called. If you missed it, check out the sermon on podcast, or the manuscript, both of which should be posted on the website and Facebook by the end of the day today.

Many of you expressed your appreciation for the Frequently Asked Questions format of my letter two weeks ago. As promised, I will continue this format and seek to answer other questions of interest to the congregation. This week, I will seek to answer some questions about our newest staff member, Rev. John Weicher, and our youth program.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs):

1) Who is John Weicher?

John is a graduate of Princeton University and Columbia Theological Seminary (in Atlanta). He was ordained as a Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) on August 15, 2005 and served for twelve years as the Associate Pastor for Christian Education and Youth at Swarthmore Presbyterian Church in Swarthmore, PA. John has directed both the Montreat and Massanetta Youth Conferences and has been a recreation leader at Montreat. He believes in the connectional nature of the Presbyterian Church and takes seriously his calling to serve in the denomination as well as in the local church. He currently serves on the Presbytery of New Hope Youth Council. He lives in Raleigh with his wife *Laurie*, who is the Associate Pastor at First Presbyterian Church in Raleigh, and their children **Tate** (7) and *Lucy* (5).

2) How did we find him?

After *Sarah Finbow* announced her resignation, the FPC Session (our governing body elected by the congregation) approved a search committee to begin the work of finding a strong leader who could be in place by the time school and our youth programming started. The members of the search committee were: *Lenore Champion* (chair), *Brent Curtis*, *Griffin Momsen-Hudson*, *Charlotte Maxwell*, *Leslie McDow*, and *Marilyn Hedgpeth* (staff). The search committee held listening sessions, worked closely with the Personnel and Budget

Committees, advertised the position, interviewed candidates, and prayed together and separately over this decision. After interviewing a number of strong candidates over the summer, they believed God was calling John Weicher to FPC. John's passion for youth, inclusion, and social justice matched perfectly with our own. The search committee and the Session voted unanimously to call him to this position and are grateful that the Holy Spirit brought us together.

3) What is his official title?

him?

John's official title is "Temporary Associate Pastor for Youth and Their Families."

4) What does "Temporary" mean?

Temporary means that John was hired by way of a contract between the session and John for a period of one year (renewable), with approval from the Commission on Ministry of the Presbytery of New Hope. A temporary position is not a permanent, installed position. In the PC (USA), a pastor is, under normal circumstances "called and installed." This means that they are called by the congregation and then installed (through a service of installation) to the position. This happens after a Pastor Nominating Committee writes a "ministry information form" and does a national search for the pastor/associate pastor position. This process, to find a permanent "called and installed" pastor, often takes one or more years. In our case, we wanted to have a strong leader in place in a much shorter period of time. This is why we were able to find John and call him as our "Temporary Associate Pastor for Youth and Their Families."

5) How long can John stay at FPC? Will he ever be able to be "called and installed?"

John is here on a one-year renewable contract. He can continue with us as long as he and we are interested in renewing the contract for another year. We also plan to elect an Associate Pastor Nominating Committee (APNC) in the coming months. They will write a "Ministry Information Form," post it nationally, and conduct a full search for a "called and installed" pastor. John will be eligible to apply for this position.

- 6) Why is he an associate pastor while Sarah Finbow, our recent staff person for youth, was the youth minister? What is the difference? John and Sarah both attended seminary and graduated with a Master of Divinity degree. Sarah, however, did not go through the ordination process (usually a three-year process that includes ongoing work with the presbytery and the passing of five ordination exams). Sarah is not an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church (or in any denomination), while John is a Minister of the Word and Sacrament in the PC(USA), as are staff members Marilyn Hedgpeth, Sam Miglarese, Cherrie Henry, Susan Dunlap, and I.
 7) Where is John's office? How is the best way to get in touch with

- 8) How are our youth groups defined? When and where do they meet? Middle school youth includes grades 6-8 and meets at the church from 4:30-6:30 p.m. on Sunday nights. High school youth includes grades 9-12 and meets at the church from 6:00-8:00 p.m. on Sunday nights. The youth room is in the area beneath the sanctuary.

The Session met on **Monday**, **August 23**, following a delicious dinner prepared by elder *Cris Rivera* and enjoyed together with the Diaconate. After prayer, sharing joys and concerns, and learning about the theology of baptism, the meeting proceeded with business. Of note:

- The **Board of Trustees meeting**, at which officers were elected for the coming year;
- A **report from delegates** who attended the **July Presbytery meeting** in Winterville;
- An update from the Strategic Planning Team, and a request for representatives from Session to join the team. *Karen Romines* and *Tom Bacon* volunteered.
- An **update from the Budget Committee**, in preparation for considering "baseline" and "goals" budgets for 2019;
- The adoption of **two motions from the Property Committee** to approve a one-year lease between the Day School and FPC, and to continue to work with law enforcement to move people sleeping on church property at night.

Class Begins September 9


Perhaps you have been visiting First Presbyterian Church for a while and want to know more about the theology, the mission, the polity and the shape of active membership at FPC. The
