From the Associate Pastor . . .

Dear Storm-Tossed Friends,

First, I want to thank all of you who sought shelter in worship at FPC on Sunday morning. It was great to hear the hubbub, and to see how delighted everyone was to be together, unharmed, in the house of the Lord. In addition, to be able to pray for our neighbors still smarting from the storm's sting, to sing *Eternal Father Strong to Save* in the midst of a hurricane, gave me chills. So thank you! And stay open to discern the ways in which we will be called to participate in the on-going hurricane recovery, day by day. (See *Tyler Momsen-Hudson's* letter in today's newsletter.)

This **Sunday**, **September 23**, we welcome two important guests to our church. First, we are delighted to have *Homer Ashby* back at FPC to lead the Faith and Community Class at 9:45 in a discussion of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Letter from a Birmingham Jail. Although it was written 45 years ago (April 16, 1963), many of its prophetic themes still ring true for us as Christians. And secondly, we will be using excerpts of Dr. King's letter in Sunday's worship liturgy as we welcome members of **Step-Up**, **Durham** and their families who will be participating in the worship service. Step-Up, Durham is a non-profit organization supported by FPC which offers free work-force readiness training, connections to real jobs, and support to those who have been underemployed or unemployed for some time. For approximately 60% of the 312 graduates who have successfully completed the Step-Up Employment Readiness Workshop over the past three years, the major barrier to employment in their past has been a criminal background. Thus the impact of Dr. King's letter from jail still resounds with their experience, and with their desire to be restored to a rightful place in the community. Because one of Jesus' primary actions in all four Gospels was to restore people to community, I am a huge advocate for Step-Up, Durham. I look forward to introducing to you **Syretta Hill**, Director of Step-Up, Durham, along with her staff, and the program graduates this Sunday.

Please join me in offering hospitality to all refugees made temporarily homeless by the hurricane, as well as our guest presenters this Sunday. FPC is always good at being a place of hospitality and welcome.


The **Rev. Jimmie Hawkins**, director of the PC(USA) Washington Office and former minister at Covenant Presbyterian Church here in Durham, confronts national issues of Peace and Justice daily.

On September 14 at a Prayer Vigil and Rally sponsored by Church World Service outside the White House, Jimmie spoke to the Administration's proposed plan to admit 25,000 or fewer refugees in 2019. Jimmie said: "As people of faith we understand that when the state won't speak, when the nation won't speak, that we will raise our voices to speak louder to say we stand with refugees from wherever they come." He continued: "There is a place in this country and our churches and in our homes for all people who have a need."

Children's Sunday School, Grades 3 - 6

Lectionary Class: Join us for discussion at 9:45 in the East Parlor. **September 23:** Is there a difference between wisdom and knowledge, or between wisdom and scholarship? How does a wise person act?

September 30: If God is in charge, what role do we have? Are there any situations in which, by our witness or our prayer or even a brave action like Esther's, we can have an important part to play? Join us for discussion at 9:45 in the East Parlor.

Journeys and Scratch Class: This hybrid class of seasoned and younger members is exploring *Prophetic Voices* this year. Join us in **room 205** of the education building at 9:45. We will join the Faith and Community Class this Sunday, September 23, to hear *Homer Ashby lead a discussion on Martin Luther King's Letter from a Birmingham Jail*.


Well, unfortunately we missed our visit to Immaculate Conception this past Sunday, so we will have to reschedule it. **This**
