Bring a dish to share. A main meat and beverages provided by the church. If you play an instrument, bring it along (with a music stand) and join the improvised orchestra that accompanies singing of carols around our Christian symbols tree.

First Presbyterian Church welcomes all who worship here. We honor and celebrate the human diversity and unity that God gives us in Christ. We welcome individuals of every age, race, nationality, gender, ability, sexual orientation, and economic circumstance to participate fully in the life of the church. So that we may better know each other, please sign the Ritual of Friendship pad, pass it along the center pew across to the shorter side pew, and then return it to the starting point, noting the names of those sitting near you.

Today's worship is patterned after the Lessons and Carols service at King's College Chapel in Cambridge, England. The traditional service of Lessons and Carols dates from 1880, but the most famous tradition is that of the service at King's College, Cambridge which began in 1918. It is always held on Christmas Eve.

The striking *Advent paraments*, purchased with funds from the bequest of Anne St. Clair Williams, were designed and created in 2012 by Laurie Wohl, a fiber-artist internationally known for her "Unweavings." The pulpit hanging contains a text in Hebrew and English drawn from Isaiah 12: 3: "With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation" while the text for the lectern hanging is from Luke 1:78-79: "The dawn from on high will break upon us to give light to guide our feet into the way of peace."

The *sanctuary table* upon which the Advent Wreath sits was made by *George Danser* and is given to us by his wife, *Jean Cary*, and him. George has drawn design features from our communion table and used oak removed from the sanctuary during our renovation and from a tree in their backyard that Jean saw get hit by lightning some years ago.

Hearing Assistance Receivers are available from the ushers. Before you leave the sanctuary please turn off the receiver and place it in the specially marked receptacle or return to an usher.

Nursery care for infants to 6 years of age is provided during worship on the second floor of the Education Building. See an usher if you need childcare. There is a changing table in the narthex, located to the left as you exit the rear of the sanctuary.

Worship bags and activity bulletins are available in the foyer for children and youth. Books are on the pews in the narthex for young children to read and enjoy should they need a break from the service.

Copies of the *These Days* devotional booklet for January – March 2019 have arrived. Pick up a copy, regular or large print, from the foyer or narthex while supplies last.

FINAL CALL for Christmas Concerns: During Advent, share Christmas wishes with friends in the congregation by making a donation to Christmas Concerns. This year's proceeds will be given to support two people who are in sanctuary: Rosa at the Church of Reconciliation and José at the School for Conversion in Durham. Both Rosa and José are parents trying to support their children who are also in the area. To participate in Christmas Concerns, write a check to First Presbyterian Church, memo: "Christmas Concerns" and put it in the offering plate. Then, visit the Giving Tree in the foyer, sign your name on an ornament and hang the ornament on the Giving Tree for all to see. The names of those who share greetings will be listed in the "Christmas" edition of the church's newsletter. The deadline to participate is TODAY.

Year-End Giving: The church must receive your charitable contributions by 12:00 p.m. on Monday, December 24, 2018; or be placed in the offering plate at a service through Sunday, December 30, 2018; or the gift must be postmarked by December 31, 2018, if mailed, to be deductible on your 2018 taxes. If you wish to make a contribution by credit card, this may be done through the church's website (www.firstpres-durham.org) at any time. To be deductible on your 2018 taxes, please initiate the gift by Friday, December 28. If you wish to make a donation through a gift of stock, please notify Tom Bloom, Business Administrator (t.bloom@firstpres-durham.org) as soon as possible. Members aged 70 ½ + who own an IRA may be able to make a tax-excludable gift directly to First Presbyterian and have that gift satisfy any required minimum distribution for this year. Please contact your IRA administrator ASAP if you wish to consider this giving option for tax year 2018.
