From the Pastor/Head of Staff:

Dear friends,

What a joy it was to celebrate our confirmands this weekend! Thank you to all the teachers, mentors, parents, and especially students who went through and supported this program of learning and growing in faith. These students learned more about God, life, the world, and themselves as they explored what it means to follow Jesus. They learned about loving God, loving neighbor, and Jesus' call to care for the poor and marginalized.

I remember my confirmation very well. Back then, children were not allowed to receive communion until they were confirmed, so Confirmation Sunday was also first communion (and my first taste of wine — another difference from back in the day). I am grateful that children are included in the sacrament of Holy Communion now. I hope for these youth on Sunday the day was memorable because they said their baptismal vows for the first time with their own voices and now carry the promises their parents made for them in their own hearts and will live out those promises in their own lives.

I know God claims and cares for these young people, whether they chose to confess their faith or not. I am grateful that God's promises in Christ extend far beyond our willingness to claim them. I pray that God will watch over our children as they grow into adulthood, and surround them with grace, hope, love, peace, and joy for all their lives.

The Session met on March 25, 2019, beginning the meeting with the examination of two confirmands who could not attend the earlier Called Meeting for this purpose, and hearing a report from Mindy about the upcoming training for new officers. Several motions were approved during the meeting, all to improve safety of the facility and the congregation: for the spending of Capital Campaign Funds for new tempered glass doors to the foyer, and for handrails for the chancel steps; and for contracting with a security company for Easter Sunday services. The Session also voted to endorse and send a letter to neighboring Muslim congregations expressing support following the violence in Christ Church, New Zealand.

SUNDAY SCHOOL and other study opportunities

Children's Sunday School (grades 3-6)

We have been trying out a new rotation model of Sunday School, which allows our $3^{\rm rd}-6^{\rm th}$ graders opportunities to experience the foundational stories of the Old Testament in many different ways through drama, art, games, LEGOS, music, cooking, gardening, etc. It has been great fun for the students and for the teaching teams! We have been making Ukranian Easter Eggs, which is an intensive (but beautiful) three-week process. The class meets in **room 201** of the education

building at 9:45. (Bring friends and join us!)

On Palm Sunday, April 14, there will be an Easter Egg hunt for the children at 9:30 in the foyer; hot cross buns for everyone in Watts-Hill Hall; and the Palm Parade around the block beginning at 10:15.

Adult "Faith & Community" -

After watching the fabulous PBS documentary, *Howard Thurman: Backs Against the Wall*, we continue our Lenten study of Thurman's seminal work, *Jesus and the Disinherited*. Howard Thurman (1900 -1981) was an African American author, philosopher, theologian, mystic, and social justice leader, **Howard Thurman**, whose theology of radical nonviolence shaped, and still shapes, many civil rights leaders. The class will conclude the study this **Sunday, April** 7, with *Rev. Wilson Gunn* leading the final chapter on "Love". In writing his book to provide succor and strength from Jesus to those who needed it most, Thurman says, "Armed resistance is apt to be a tragic last resort in the life of the disinherited. ... Jesus chose another alternative: The kingdom of heaven is in us." (p. 15) All are welcome to join this class discussion. We meet on Sunday mornings in Watts-Hill Hall at 9:45.

An additional opportunity to read and discuss Thurman's book will be on Fridays, room 205, from noon – 1 p.m., March 8 – April 12 (excluding April 5th), facilitated by *Marilyn Hedgpeth*. If you are not familiar with Thurman, this is a great opportunity to become familiar with this founding father of the civil rights movement.

Faith and Community will not meet on April 14th or April 21 due to Palm Sunday and Easter Services on those dates. However. We will have a reception during the Sunday School hour on April 14th, with coffee and hot cross buns, before the Palm Parade around the block to our neighboring churches begins at 10:15. And we will have a light brunch between the 9:00 and 11:00 services on Easter Sunday, April 21. So plan to come and enjoy conversing with your friends during Holy Week.

April 7: Tears turned into shouts of joy? Rivers in the desert? A proud, pious Pharisee ready to give up everything for Jesus? God is definitely doing a new thing. Are you ready for it? Join us for discussion at 9:45 in the East Parlor.

Women's Spiritual Formation - *Susan Dunlap* leads this class for women in the **basement parlor** at 9:45. This class is a great support system of sharing and prayer for women.

I believe that God wants us to *hope*, and to expect a favorable future. (*Lily*)

I believe that God is all-loving. (Kayla)

I believe that in times of darkness, it is very important to *hope* in God. (*Laura*) God is *love*, or I believe that Jesus *loves* me. (*Anna*)

But most of the time we will be working on an array of service projects, like: preparing hurricane kits; making and packing lunches for Urban Ministries and Open Table; making blessing bags; gathering supplies for our Armed Forces; packing backpacks with school supplies; etc. So the \$10/\$30 cost covers dinner, plus supplies for the projects.

What: In the three-hour Groundwater Approach workshop, trainers use data and stories from a variety of sources to demonstrate the ongoing and pervasive impact of race. This research-based presentation focuses on the following six points that are essential to understanding the realities of systemic racism as a predictor of outcomes in all institutions.

1. Racial inequity looks the same across systems.

- 2. Socio-economic difference does not explain the racial inequity.
- 3. Systems contribute significantly to disparities.
- 4. The systems-level disparities cannot be explained by a few 'bad apples' or ill-intentioned gatekeepers.
- 5. Poor outcomes are concentrated in certain geographic communities; usually poor communities and communities of color.
- 6. An analysis that includes race often draws starkly different conclusions than one that does not.
