From the Parish Associate:

A clergy friend recently told a group of us that every baptized Christian is called to sit in three chairs: the armchair, the circled chair, and the pew. By the armchair, she meant that solitary daily place where we contemplate and pray in the presence of God. By the circled chair she meant those weekly and monthly places where we sit in small circles face-to-face with other disciples of Christ to study, serve, and share our lives. By pew, she meant weekly worship where we gather on long benches to all face in the same direction in worship to God.



As Trinity Sunday nears when we contemplate the three-in-one, one-in-three mystery of our God, we see often will see portrayals of the Trinity as three Celtic knot interlocking circles. When I think of my friend's three chairs they seem to me to be like those overlapping Celtic Trinity circles. Each place we sit informs the other places. Taken together they dance a "holy chair dance" that sweeps us up into their orbit and makes us more complete. Each chair is important. No chair can be forgotten, just as no person of the Trinity can be forgotten. Every chair is interdependent and makes the others more satisfying places to sit.

This summer, I pray we will all hear the call of these three chairs. May the Spirit sound in our souls the call of those beautiful chairs to us. A call to be knitted together, inside and out, individually and as a community, into the saving wholeness God wants for us all.

- The Great Big Church Family Festival (GBCFF), hosted by FPC on Sunday night was a huge success, thanks to the help of so many people. We had 96 people attend the event: 68 adults, 28 children, including our 15 Muslim guests from INCA Relief in Raleigh. Coming on Pentecost Sunday, there was a powerful spirit of openness that pervaded the activities, as friends from FPC joined with Trinity Avenue Presbyterian, Mt. Bethel Presbyterian and the Muslim community to spend an evening in fellowship together. It was a beautiful exhibition of "God so-loving the world" as we came together to share a meal, enjoy a fabulous story and skit about "who's the greatest" from Mark 9:33-37, and to engage in service projects that benefit three missions to our community. The group made 250 lunches for Urban Ministries of Durham, and decorated lunch bags with messages of hope and encouragement; decorated baffles to hold insulation for Habitat for Humanity; and packed 10 buckets with cleaning supplies for hurricane relief to benefit Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. Beth Stringfield and Cris *Rivera* provided another beautiful and filling meal to keep everyone happy and healthy as they worked. 




and beverages will be provided by the church. Plan to bring a side dish or dessert to share. Come and enjoy this time of fellowship under our beautiful crepe myrtles!

1963. In quiet Lake Charles, Louisiana, the destruction of a Confederate statue might just signal that change is in the air... But, whatever the progress of the civil rights movement, in the Gellman household things seem just the same – for now

Eight year old Noah, heartbroken by the death of his mother and his father's remarriage, sneaks down to the basement to spend time with the maid he idolizes, Caroline Thibodeaux: Caroline who runs everything.
