# From the Associate Pastor for Youth and Their Families:

Dear Friends,

I had never heard the term until I went there for the first time — a "thin place." A thin place is a location where in some strange way, it seems like the boundary between heaven and earth has rubbed thin, and God is so close you could perhaps reach out and touch the Divine with your very own hands. This has been a wonderful way for me to think about the world — a meaningful concept to put to many of meaningful experiences over the years. Perhaps you have a thin place of your own — the beach, a special mountain, a place your volunteer regularly, the sanctuary of your childhood church.

The place in which I first learned about thin places was Massanetta Springs, on the edge of Harrisonburg, Virginia. Eight of our middle schoolers, adult leader Amy Wilson, and I just returned from there after four days of their middle school conference. I have been taking youth to Massanetta for many years, and each conference is special. It remains one of my thin places. But each experience is different of course – different youth, different group dynamics, different conference leadership.

There is a particular joy when there is a mostly new group, like we had this year. FPC has been going to Massanetta for years, but six of our eight were first timers, including five rising 6<sup>th</sup> graders. So, they heard their first for-MSersspecifically keynote, sang their first theme song, did their first energizers (feel free to ask what that is in person), and were led by their first high school small group leader, or "Advocate." (Our own *Annabelle Brown* will be one in July, like *James Compton* and *Rosa Ramirez*, before her.)

Our crew threw themselves into the experience. Our soft-spoken graduated 8<sup>th</sup> grader looked around in his small group when no one was talking and realized that it meant he ought to be breaking the ice. Our newbies made friends from different states. Two of our youngest led the way in evening conversations about faith, prayer, God and going back home again. They flew down the gigantic slip and slide on the back lawn, got their hair don'ted (the opposite of a "hairdo"), and had their face painted. They were able to play, which is one way to get out from under the pressure of middle school, and sing loudly, which is another. They got to dance. And twice a day, they walked up the big hill 30 minutes early to wait in line so they could sit in the front row for worship or keynote. (I invite you to the giant foyer bulletin board to see photos of all of this.)

Massanetta may not be their first thin place, but for many of them, this was their first experience in the thinness of that place, where the Gospel is spoken and embodied as if it were specifically for middle schoolers. Of course, it is specifically

for middle schoolers, just like it is specifically for you and for me. So rarely in a sanctuary setting with grandbabies, grandparents and everyone in between populating the pews, however, do middlers get to hear it in their own words, with their own cultural references, addressing the particular faith challenges of being 11 or 12 or 13 or 14 in the Year of Our Lord, 2019.

Each night, our last activity is "back home group," when the church from back home (i.e., FPC, for us) gathers to share and reflect on our day and what we've heard. The last night, like I often do, I asked them to share where they had felt close to God during the week – or if that language didn't make sense, what had been the most meaningful thing to them. One said closing vespers. Another said the community. A third said the keynotes. But they all said something – including Amy and me, we all said something about feeling close to God. Because God is right there, all of the time, and sometimes, things are thin enough to notice.

# Sunday, July 14 15th Sunday Ordinary Time A Service of Healing and Wholeness

As *John Weicher* spoke to so eloquently in his sermon on June 23 from Luke 9: 37-45, all of us

know what it is like to be a parent in anguish over a child who is sick in body, mind or spirit; or to be a child who is worried about a parent or sibling who is likewise broken. All of us seek the individual healing that Jesus so freely offers.

But our healing also has social dimensions: the healing of divided communities and nations; the healing of the earth; the healing of relationships; the healing of the Church; all have their place alongside the healing of our broken bodies, hurt minds and wounded hearts. Realizing our mutual brokenness, part of the worship service on **THIS SUNDAY**, **July 14** will be a ritual of blessing for our mutual healing. We rarely do this ritual in worship, but perhaps we should do it more often in this City of Medicine. The disciples could not heal the boy who is seized by an evil spirit, but Jesus does heal him. God's desire is for our shalom, and God's power is beyond our best medicines. If you have a desire for restoration to wholeness, join us in worship on July 14!


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# Women's Spiritual Formation Class -
