From the Associate Pastor:

Commitment to Serve

The Church of Jesus Christ has many components and may be summarized in our communal life together: we believe, we pray, we support, and we serve. Let me reflect with you on our commitment to serve.

We all talk about service. I think, traditionally, people understood "serving or being a servant" as a rather low level job, unless it is tied to some form of public service in government. We speak of the service sector of our economy, the ways people make a living by providing others with various forms of service. This is not manufacturing or farming or transportation sectors but those providing entertainment, hospitality, communication, counselling, or any host of other possibilities. Service has become widely understood as a commercial term, part of the job sector called the service industry.

My work at Duke University speaks also to service in the context of civic engagement. This is true for Carolina, State, and Central, too. Our motto has been to set knowledge at the service of humanity. The movement of civic engagement at universities is to inspire young men and women to embrace both the challenges of scholarship and the values of citizenship. At our best, colleges and universities are called to combine excellence in the class room and laboratory with the highest ideals of service to community and nation.

For people of faith, however, "service," "serving," and "being a servant" have a very different meaning. In faith, we understand service as Jesus described it and in fact lived it. The classic passage that immediately comes to mind is Mark 10:42-45: "For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for the many." Notice what Jesus says about himself as the Son of Man who serves. He just does not do favors or acts of kindness for people, but ultimately "gives his life" for others. We must also be marked with that same characteristic: to give oneself for others.

Beyond the immediate circumstances of our lives, we must look to a larger world. How does God want me to bring the Good News of Jesus Christ with its hope and possibilities into a wounded and broken world? And yes, the Church is also a place for our service. We could not function without the commitment of so many hours of service that include liturgical ministries, Christian education, service and mission, sacred music, and governance.

Do consider, pray over, and discern in this Pentecost season how God wants you to serve. Your serving will be in the model and pattern of Jesus and particular to the call and invitation that God gives you.

The FPC staff prayed for your concerns at our staff meeting on July 16. Although the following list does not name individuals who were listed, it does give you an indication of the kinds of situations people in our congregation carry within their hearts. And it shows how beautifully human and vulnerable each one of us is as we stand before God:

Peace and contentment at school and home; forgiveness; refugees – facing border barriers; our nation, upcoming elections; courage to be your true disciple; those in detention centers on the border; fear of the unknown and change; effects of lingering grief; motivation for good employment; individuals and families on our border; equity and justice for people of color; healing from grief and mental illness; stress of care-giving; the poor and destitute; Kenya and the whole world; healing for our divided country; those coping with a lovedone's dementia; those adjusting to life-changes; those under Hospice care; those suffering from addiction; the health of our planet; peace in the world; freedom from want and fear; an upcoming marriage; our children; victims of ICE raids and their families; those migrant families separated and mistreated at the border; children who are unloved, abused, bullied, and unwanted; the generational horrors to come from this generation's leadership; children and families in trauma; health and peace; healing for our country; Sudan; NC Legislature; Honduras; those who live alone; those traveling; ability to have a child; our friends who are not US citizens; denial of women's choices and rights; children in war zones; the sick and hungry; those who are incarcerated; and many individuals who are much loved and lifted up in prayer to God.

Summer Sunday School is off and running for children, youth, and adults.

Children meet upstairs in room 208 for Storypath, an exploration of some of the best new books in children's literature with theological implications for young and old alike.

Storypath for July 28 – *The Perfect Nest*, by Catherine Friend: a story about a cat who comes up with a plan that he believes will get him what he wants, many birds to lay eggs in the nest for him to make omelets. After building the nest, birds start to lay eggs and they hatch after the birds have left. So, the cat must then take care of the hatchlings and learns that caring for others is more important than fulfilling his intended plan. This class will be led by *Marilyn Hedgpeth*, (who wishes she had the perfect nest) and *Thilo Fullenkamp*.

Storypath for August 4 – Wangari's Tree of Peace, by Jeanette Winter. Wangari Maathai was born in 1940 in a small village in Kenya. Each day she marveled at the umbrella of green trees that surrounded her village in the shadow of Mount Kenya. As a child, she talked to the birds in the trees and helped harvest sweet potatoes, sugarcane and maize from the rich soil. Wangari was brilliant in school and was awarded a scholarship to attend college in America. But when she returned to her homeland of Kenya as a young woman, she was devastated to see that all of the trees had been cut down, and the land was barren. That's when Wangari decided to make a difference – one seedling at a time. By 2004, thirty million trees had been planted, and the lives of many women and their families had changed in marvelous ways. That same year, she was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Come and hear this remarkable true story about the difference that one person can make to heal the earth of her wounds! The class will be led by **Lenore Champion and Susan Buck.**


