### From the Parish Associate:

Difficult scriptures. Have you noticed that's what we've had this summer in our worship? Last Sunday our fearless *Mary Berry* (Candidate for PCUSA Ministry of Word and Sacrament and a Ph.D. in-the-making) took on some of St. Paul's hard-to-appreciate understandings of marriage. Two weeks before, *Dr. Jenny Copeland* talked about an obtuse story from the Elisha (not Elijah!) narratives. And earlier in July, Associate Pastor *Marilyn Hedgpeth* dared to wrestle with Jesus' teachings about what defiles us!

All this came as a result of a challenge Marilyn offered to those preaching this summer - to bust out of our usual Common Lectionary A, B, C cycle into some Year D lectionary passages. (Year D for those who don't know, is an added lectionary year for congregations who want to experience some of the scriptures that A, B, and C years leave out. . .most especially some texts that are a bit more "unsavory" than most!)

I want to thank Marilyn for this challenge and every preacher this summer who took it on. I am also thankful for all our "*Just Mercy*" teachers and presenters, as well as those who got on the train with folks from **Covenant** and **Timothy Darling Presbyterian Churches** on their pilgrimage to the International Civil Rights Museum in Greensboro. Who says summer is only for remediation or simply marching in place?

And if you don't mind me rifting a bit on Mindy's sabbatical theme, I think we've all learned that summer is as good a time as any, to knock on and break down some walls we have come to expect will never yield for us. I feel privileged to be part of a church family that is not afraid of such work. This makes First Presbyterian a unique place in our lives and in the life of our city.

Thank you for being church together this summer! Won't it be fun for us to catch Pastor Mindy up on our wall-breaking time together, even as she tells us stories of her own?

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# Women's Spiritual Formation Class -





## **Who Is My Faith Neighbor?**

Sunday Evenings September 8 - November 24 5:00 - 6:00 p.m. at FPC

This will be an experiential learning class for adults who may or may not have children or youth in programs on Sunday evenings. Using Barbara Brown Taylor's latest book, *Holy Envy*, we will read and discuss religious plurality in the Durham area, and observe how others express their faith. Says Taylor: *Contrary to popular opinion, all religions are not alike. Their followers see the world in very distinct ways. Their understandings of the human condition proceed from different assumptions, leading them to propose different remedies. ... I found things to envy* 

in all of the traditions I taught. Some were compatible with Christian faith, like the Jewish Sabbath or the Buddhist focus on compassion. Others forced a choice, like the Muslim understanding that God has no offspring or the Hindu view that humans create their own destiny through many lifetimes. This left some important questions on the table. Is there a sovereign God? Can someone else die on a cross for my sins? Could my faith be improved by the faith of others? (Taylor, p. 10, 11) Visits are planned this fall to the Sikh Gurudwara, Judea Reform, Ar Razzaq Masjid and The Durham Friends Congregation. Those visits will take place at various times, but our discussions will be on Sunday evenings, running September 8 – November 24. To register and get a book, contact *Marilyn Hedgpeth*.
