Dear Friends,

As we look back on the past year, I am so very grateful for all that God has been doing here at First Presbyterian Church. As people of faith in the heart of the city, we worship



God, grow in faith and love, care for one another, and serve the community around us. It is not easy being the church in the world these days. Around us we see the effects of greed and power in big business, in big pharma, in our own government, and in too many other places. We witness the poor in our midst who can't seem to get a break as they try to balance crisis after crisis in their lives. We experience directly the effects of global climate change and fear for the future of our planet. We learn the way that racism has become embedded in the systems around us - education, government, health care, judicial, corporate, housing, and religious – to the point that too many don't even notice it and are not willing to believe it could be true. We watch, feeling helpless, as refugees are kept from entering the U.S. and immigrants are rounded up and sent home. We know that Jesus calls us to love our neighbor and every day we seek to understand what that means for us in our daily lives. We pray about it and talk to our friends and family members about it and we long for the world to be the way God intends for it to be.

I know, as you do, that our role in the overall scheme of the world is small, so small, and yet what we do here in the heart of the city of Durham does make a difference. The funding and sweat equity we give to non-profits such as Housing for New Hope and Habitat for Humanity help real individuals and families find sustainable housing. The financial and volunteer support we give to Iglesia Emanuel strengthens a community often felt forgotten and afraid. The significant support we give to the FPC Day School allows for children to attend on scholarships so that their parents can keep their jobs. The time, talent, and resources of this church help feed the hungry, educate the illiterate, house the homeless, comfort the grieving, teach the gospel message of Jesus' love to children, youth, and adults, provide for job training, support missions overseas, and work for systemic change. What we do here matters, by God's grace, and the impact of the above can and will be felt for generations to come. God has called us to this place for a reason and that reason is always centered around love – God's love for us and our love for one another. Everything we do should be about our responding to God's gift of love in our lives and sharing the grace of Christ in the world.

I am humbled and deeply grateful to be a part of this community of faith that has so ably weathered all the changes that Durham has seen in the past one-hundred and forty-eight years. Our presence here at the corner of Roxboro and Main is significant and God's love emanates from this place and into all the areas where you teach, build, learn, serve, work, play, grow, live, and pray.

I hope you will take the time to look through this document. In it you will find glimpses and signs of the significant and diverse ways we respond to God's calling in our lives together as members and friends of First Presbyterian Church. May we continue to embrace God's call on us to be the light in the center of the city – the light of Christ that brings hope, joy, and love to all along the way.

My theme for this year has been "neighborlove." How do we, as a church, make neighbor-love manifest in God's world?

Once again, I had a delightful experience of leading the confirmation process for 16 sixth, seventh



and eighth graders from September – March. Our confirmation class this year included two youth from Covenant Presbyterian Church and their mentors, which was a true joy. Since our faith vocabulary is so important to our spiritual formation, each confirmand and mentor picked a faith word, which they printed on a t-shirt, and studied through the year; words like grace, mercy, compassion, peace, love, and joy. And we worked on being good neighbors as we took our faith on the road and visited the Sikh Gurudwara, Judea Reform, Durham Friends, Farm Church, the Greek Orthodox Church, Ar Razzaq Masjid, and others. It was experiential learning for our youth and mentors as we learned to make friends and build bridges, to practice respect and theological humility across lines of differentiation in our community, which is how Christians are called to practice neighbor-love.

Since last year's report, I also arranged two of our Great Big Church Family Festivals; also experiences of neighbor-love. The first, in August of 2018, was at Camp New Hope, where we invited friends from Iglesia Presbiteriana Emanuel to join us at the beautiful outdoor setting with other faith friends from Trinity Avenue Presbyterian, Mt. Bethel Presbyterian, and Duke Memorial United Methodist Churches. It was a fun afternoon of swimming, crafts, service projects, and worship together as good neighbors. Later FPC hosted another GBCFF in June 2019, welcoming Muslim youth from ICNA Relief in Raleigh to join us in service projects to serve our greater community. In our "broken and fearful world" (*A Brief Statement of Faith*), it doesn't hurt to weave a tight web of connections and mutual reliance for stability and peace.

And lastly, I don't want to underestimate the powerful learnings about neighborlove that take place from Sunday to Sunday in our myriad Sunday School and weekday classes. These are small-group laboratories of Bible study, discussion, and prayer. In these classes, faith gleaned and praxis come together as we are transformed in the way of Jesus, and sent out to love God and love neighbor day by day. I am thankful for the many teachers at FPC, who make this gathering, learning, and sending possible on a weekly basis. I am so grateful to God for giving me this particular beloved community of disciples to hone my neighbor-love skills along-side yours. Peace!

Here are some places our Young Adults group has praised God, dealt with the ways we imprison ourselves and one another, and been curious about the borders and stories God has brought to our attention this year:

- Young Adults were very active in this year's successful Stewardship program with several writing from their personal experiences of stewardship and even producing a media presentation for the Stewardship season.
- Six of our Young adults serve as Elders, Deacons, and staff for FPC.
- Three of our Young Adults are Candidates for Ministry in the PCUSA.

- Young adults serve on many of the committees of the church. They are also Church School teachers, youth group advisors, chancel choir members, quartet players, bell choir members, and Confirmation Class mentors.
- Young adults strengthen our worship leadership by singing in the choir, ringing bells, playing in the Wind Ensemble, chanting, singing solos, reading scripture, serving as liturgist, folding palm crosses for Palm Sunday, ushering and even preaching during our Advent mid-week services.
- Young adults served in the Community Kitchen, volunteered with the Florence Forth Race, helped with fellowship meals, and wrote Christmas cards to Death Row inmates.
- Nurturing the bonds of fellowship, the Scratch group potlucks monthly with the best of them!
- In January, the Scratch group met in a 3-hour planning retreat where they mapped out their 2019 year together.
- During Lent we had a weekly Sunday afternoon study of the Gospel of Matthew
- 16 persons attended our first Camp-out at Camp New Hope. While there we enjoyed cooking hobo packs, singing around a campfire, playing games, evening and morning prayer, walking a labyrinth, and ice-cream at Mapleview Farms.

First Presbyterian supports a Children's Choir, a Handbell Choir, and a Chancel Choir which lead the congregation in song and provides anthems and special music at services throughout the year. We also support and encourage our young people who have artistic gifts by asking them to play and sing on occasion.

First Presbyterian continues to make its sanctuary available to various community musical groups as part of our outreach to the city. This year we hosted an "Organ Crawl" for the Durham Arts Council, the proceeds of which went for children's summer scholarships at the Arts Council. The following groups also held concerts here: the North Carolina Baroque Orchestra, Singers of New and Ancient Music (all of the donations supported an Hispanic elementary school program), Vox Vivorum (an all men's chorus), Women's Voices, Mallarme Baroque Concert with flute masterclass, the Triangle Recorder Society, and the American Guild of Organists' sponsor of a concert by young artist, *Matthew Cates*.

We hosted Composer-in Residence, James Biery, from Gross Pointe, Michigan in October, and sung three of his anthems and heard his organ compositions with brass quintet. The Chancel Choir also enjoyed learning three anthems with texts composed by Mel Bringle, our McPherson lecturer.

We used proceeds from the **Horst and Ruth Mary Meyer Endowment for Music** to join forces with St. Phillip's Episcopal Church in presenting a concert with orchestra in honor of the Meyers. I chose music that spoke of their love for nature as well as the beautiful Fauré Requiem. This is a fund from which we can draw to enhance music here at First Presbyterian in many ways and will continue Horst and Ruth Mary's vision of the powerful ways that music can bring people together. We intend to also use this money to bring in guest artists and provide free community concerts. We have a Meyer committee which will formulate guidelines as to how to be good stewards of this wonderful gift.

Lastly, we are going to try something different with the Children's Choir. We are going to form a joint Young People's Choir with Covenant Presbyterian. The choir will sing at both churches and include a more substantial educational component. Dr. Brennetta Simpson, who teaches Music Education at North Carolina Central University, will conduct the choir. We'll begin this in the fall and try it for a year.

I enjoyed using some continuing education time to go to Montreat this year for the Worship and Music Conference. It's always good to hear new ideas and meet new colleagues.

I am honored to work at a place that holds music in such high regard. Thank you.

John Weicher Temporary Associate Pastor to Youth and Their Families

It has been a wonderful year of warm welcome for me and my family at First Presbyterian Church. I began serving as your stated supply associate pastor for youth and their families on August 1, 2018, and I have felt nothing but welcome and invitation at First Presbyterian Church. I am thankful for all of the kindness that folks have shown me, from helping my children in worship, to inviting me to all manner of events, to explaining things to me gently when I already think I know it all. Thank you. You are most kind.

Here are some of the highlights for me in this year of ministry with you...

- Sunday night youth group. First, the numbers: In the middle school youth group, we've had an average of 5-6 youth, with a high of 14 at one event, and 21 different members and friends attending at least once. I would consider 8 or so of our middlers as "regulars." In the high school youth group, we've had an average of 10-11 youth, with a high of 21 at one event, and 22 different members and 12 different friends attending at least once. I would consider 14 or so of our high schoolers as "regulars."
- But ministry is far more than numbers. Our theme this fall was belonging to the alternative community of the church, using the Pentecost text of Acts 2. Our theme after Youth Sunday was about having a big hope in a fearful world, using the Easter story. We have had great fun, including the indoor inflatable obstacle course, Massanetta-night hair don'ts, the white elephant gift exchange and the year-end competition with the Scratch group. We've had meaningful conversations around fear and hope, around who the church is, and our theme texts for Youth Sunday. Both middlers and high schoolers have participated in our presbytery's retreats and a FPC-only overnight and day of service. And much more. I am particularly thankful for our advisor teams: Lenore Champion, Graeme Peterson, Courtney Trutna (all HS), Laurie Ray (both), Brent Curtis, and Sarah Beaverson (all MS).
- Weekly Hangouts. This winter and spring, the high schoolers would meet at a rotation of coffee shops before school on Tuesday mornings. This has transformed during the summer to MSers and HSers at Pelican's SnoBalls on Tuesday afternoons. It has been a joy to connect with our youth in a less structured way and to get to know them better. Again, I am thankful for our advisors' leadership in this.
- Youth Sunday. Our youth were fabulous in text and hymn selection, liturgy writing, worship leadership (both spoken and musical), and preaching with special thanks to our preachers, *Danny Creadick and Maryn Leonard*.
- Service to the Larger Church. This summer, *Annabelle Brown* was an advocate (high school leader) at Massanetta. *Laura McDow and Lenore Champion* were leaders in

different ways at the Presbyterian Youth Triennium. And I got the chance to lead recreation at Weeks 1 and 2 of the Montreat Youth Conference.

• **Other Joys**: teaching high school Sunday school with *Emily Hansel* on the Apocrypha, from the sublime to the ridiculous, learning to coordinate and create so much social media, writing liturgy and preaching on Sunday mornings, accompanying youth and their families as we continue to grow in faith and live faithfully on this God-given planet.

The Session called two congregational meetings: on February 10, 2019, to elect members of the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee; and on March 10, 2019, the Annual Congregational Meeting, to elect officers and Nominating Committee members for the coming year, hear a report of the state of the church, hear a report on the budget, and approve the changes to the pastors' terms of call.

The Session held called meetings as needed throughout the year, primarily for the business of examining and approving new members, including the confirmation class; approving baptisms during that Sunday's worship; and approving a wedding to be conducted during worship.

The Session held 11 stated meetings, during which they received reports from committee chairs, voted on motions brought from committees, and heard reports from teams within the congregation and other organizations. The work of the committees is reported elsewhere in this Annual Report. Other actions of the Session include:

- Oversaw the work of the church under Pastor Mindy Douglas.
- Participated in a 36-hour off-site planning retreat with the Long Range Planning Team and church staff.
- Heard reports from: the Legacy Society, the Long Range Planning Team, the Criminal Justice Resource Center, and the Religious Coalition for a Non-violent Durham.
- Approved requests from the Personnel Committee to search for and hire a Church Staffing Consultant and to form a search committee for the permanent Associate

Pastor for Youth and their Families, and heard reports and approved the submission of church information related to those searches.

- Approved the appointment of *John Weicher* as temporary supply Associate Pastor for Youth and Their Families, through November 2019, covering the time since the previous youth minister's departure and through the search for a permanent youth pastor.
- Discussed safety during worship and other public events on church property, and approved the hiring of additional security for expected large worship services (Christmas, Easter, etc.), as well as recruiting of volunteers to monitor the property during worship and other events.
- Discussed policies for receiving anonymous letters to the Session.
- Discussed methods and instituted efforts to make the work of the Session more transparent to the congregation, including meeting notes in the newsletter, information on the website, and contact information for the Clerk of Session.
- Approved the formation of an ad hoc committee to explore ongoing physical issues with the CE Building.
- Endorsed:
 - A letter to Reynolds American Inc. in support of NC Farmworkers
 - Letters to Iglesia Emanuel and to our Muslim brothers and sisters in faith in support of their congregations following discriminatory and racist acts or threats to their livelihood.
 - Two hunger grant applications to the New Hope Presbytery which would benefit local hunger relief efforts
- Approved a Commendation for *Katharine Smith*, Director of the First Presbyterian Day School, upon her retirement from the position.
- Approved a lease between FPC and First Presbyterian Day School.
- Heard reports from delegates to New Hope Presbytery meetings throughout the year.
- Met jointly with the Diaconate.
- Examined new officers.
- Approved communion dates for the year.

The 2018 Annual Statistical Report (ASR), included with this report and submitted to the Presbyterian Church USA in early 2019, reflected 501 active members. While this appears to be a net loss from the previous year, most of the membership decline is due to the Membership Committee's cleaning of the rolls. Twelve new members joined during 2018, and 12 members either transferred to other congregations or died. In 2018 First Presbyterian Church conducted four child baptisms. The age distribution was balanced with about 40% under the age of 40 and 40% over the age of 55. Slightly more than 10% of the members are from a racial or ethnic minority. Before approving this report, the Session noted that the number of young adults (25 years old and under) listed under Christian Education does not accurately reflect the active young adult ministry of FPC; and that changes to the ASR's reporting methods yielded inaccurate financial data.

On August 27, 2018, the **Board of Trustees** met in order to elect officers for the 2018-2019 year. The new officers are:

President - *Lenore Champion* Vice President - *Jane Wettach* Secretary - *Christyn Klinck* Treasurer - *Torrell Armstrong*.

After electing new officers, it was moved, seconded, and passed to close the meeting.

We had a great year in Christian Education. Here are highlights of our work this year, in no particular order.

- We planned summer Sunday School for children so they can continue in the habit of coming on a weekly basis and participating. The curriculum this year was based on children's picture books with lessons provided by Union Presbyterian Seminary. We recruit teachers who are responsible for one week, opening up the process to those who want to help with the kids but may not be able to commit for a whole year.
- We have ongoing recruitment and training for Sunday School teachers.
- We have solidified the background check process for all volunteers who work with children and youth. Thanks to the Personnel Committee for their help with this.
- Christmas is a very busy time for us every year. We plan and facilitate the Advent Festival, Children's Pageant, and our participation in the Durham Downtown Holiday Parade.
- We plan and host a monthly event for families with children. This is a Sunday afternoon event where parents of young children can drop them off at church. We have three volunteers who have activities and a light meal with the kids while the parents walk to a downtown restaurant for some time together. We have been doing this for two years and have the goal of this group of parents starting a new social group along the lines of First Friends.

- Mindy has been leading a Sunday School class that deals with parenting issues.
- Perhaps the biggest event of the year was the hiring of *John Weicher* to be the new Minister to Youth and their Families. Most of the search committee was members of the Christian Education Committee and we were extremely pleased to find such a fine candidate, especially considering the short time frame. He brings experience and energy to our youth program.
- The youth group made four major trips to conferences at Montreat, Massanetta, Camp Kanata, and Triennium. The church provides financial assistance for those.
- We continue to plan and host the Great Big Church Family Festival. This is a summer activity, done cooperatively with two other Presbyterian churches. Each church hosts a day filled with activities, fellowship and service work.
- We had an unusually large confirmation class this year, with nearly 20 confirmands. Youth in that group included members from Iglesia Emanuel and Covenant Presbyterian Church.
- In months that have five Sundays, we plan for something a little different. This year we did a multi-generational worship service and a multi-sensory worship service.
- Adult Sunday School classes continue to be a vital presence. We currently have seven different options, covering a variety of ages, formats and interests.

The Nominating Committee filled the slates for the offices of Deacon and Elder for the Class of 2022. The Committee also nominated members of the Associate Pastor (for Youth and Their Families) Nominating Committee and the At-Large members of the Nominating Committee. These nominees were elected at a Congregational Meeting on February 10.

Completing the transition from "Youth Elders and Deacons" serving single year terms, youth will begin serving full three-year terms beginning with the Class of 2022.

Summary of Activities

During the 2018–2019 year, the Personnel Committee's principal focus remained on pay equity for the Associate Pastor and Minister of Music positions. The Committee worked with the Stewardship Committee to ensure the need to address that issue again prominently featured in stewardship campaign materials, and worked with the Budget

Committee and the Session to secure substantial raises for those positions for the 2019 budget, building on the raises achieved in the 2018 budget. At this point, the Committee believes we have achieved appropriate pay equity for the Associate Pastor and Minister of Music positions.

The Committee is continuing to research and assess salaries of all staff to ensure we are paying our personnel fairly and equitably, and will continue to work for salary adjustments in future budget years where warranted.

The Committee also continues to plan for anticipated staff turnover from potential retirements in the medium term. As part of that planning process, after a thorough vetting process we have hired the **Center for Progressive Renewal** to consult with us on a limited basis about how to align our staffing strategy going forward with our goals and long-range vision as a church. **Rev. Cameron Trimble** from the Center for Progressive Renewal will be visiting the church for two days in early September 2019. We look forward to working with Rev. Trimble and her team to clarify our vision for the church staff moving forward.

The Committee's other activities included conducting a performance evaluation for the head of staff and reviewing performance evaluations of other staff members, continued periodic review of the church's Personnel Handbook, and addressing further personnel concerns as raised by staff or members of the congregation.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE

The Property Committee sees to the day-to-day maintenance of the church and grounds and is to anticipate, prepare for, and oversee major repairs and improvements.

The past year has been filled with many challenges and achievements in the care of the grounds and campus at First Presbyterian Church.

In the summer of 2018, we began to address some cooling issues in the first floor of the Christian Education (CE) Building. In August of 2018 an adjustable hydraulic oak organ bench was ordered to provide a more welcoming setup for organists at the church and the bench arrived in November.

In the winter of 2018, a formal lease between the church and the day school was established along with different forms of environmental testing. The water fountain and air testing showed no areas of concern. Areas of asbestos containing material have been identified in various areas of the CE Building and the air testing confirmed that the air is safe. The presence of this material is important to note for future work and renovation of the CE Building and as the air monitoring has shown, should not present any risk to any individuals in the CE Building unless improper or unauthorized work is done. As the Church completes our asbestos management plan, part of the plan will include regular intervals of air monitoring.

The fall and winter of 2018 unfortunately brought news of more significant issues related to the cooling system for the first floor of the CE Building. The committee chair conducted several contractor walk-throughs to begin gathering quotes and solutions for a permanent solution to address the cooling needs for the first floor of the CE Building. We hired an engineering firm to calculate HVAC load calculations and the impact of replacing the glass in the windows of the CE Building.

In the Spring of 2019, the committee selected a proposal to the existing single large heating/cooling system to four separate smaller heating/cooling systems to cover the established four heating/cooling zones on the first floor. The Property Committee also interviewed and recommended a night-time security company, Signal 88, to Session for approval. Signal 88 began doing nightly patrols of the grounds in Jan 2019. The Gardens and Landscaping Committee stays very active during the year tending to various needs of the church grounds. The roses around the church were unfortunately found to be diseased and had to be removed. Due to the nature of the disease, roses will not be able to replanted in the future, but the landscaping subcommittee is reviewing options for new plantings to occur in the fall of 2019.

SERVICE AND MISSION COMMITTEE

This year Service and Mission continued to be a good steward of the generous financial gifts the congregation makes for local and world mission and also focused on raising awareness in the church of social needs in our community. In responding to the request from the listening sessions in 2017 for more education on FPC community involvement, we continued with more frequent Minutes for Mission from partner organizations. Discussions were also begun on using social media to spotlight our partner agencies as well as members that are active with them. The social media project will need more work to become reality. To increase our knowledge of our partner agencies we had the

seven largest recipients attend a monthly meeting to updates us on their programs and needs.

Budget

The budget for 2018 was \$155,000 (both Operating and Endowment). The top five recipients are the Day School (\$46,000), FPC Walk-In Ministry (\$6,000 plus an additional \$18,200 from the Lenten Match) Iglesia Emanuel (\$23,700), Presbytery (\$20,000) and Housing for New Hope (\$9,000 and additional \$3,000 from the Lenten Match). The Lenten Match began in spring of 2018 with an original balance of \$41,305 primarily to supplement crisis needs giving. The balance in the Lenten Match was \$15,774 in May 2019.

The 2018 operating budget was an increase of \$15,000 over the 2017 budget due to an increase in pledges. The 2019 budget is the same as the 2018 budget as the increased pledges were primarily devoted to making the personnel budget more equitable. The goal for 2020 is to continue to grow the Service and Mission budget to its historical percentage of the church operating budget. Our committee will work with Stewardship on the messaging for the 2019 campaign.

Activities

While the committee takes seriously its responsibility to spend the congregation's benevolences wisely, the passion lies in the activities.

<u>Day School</u> had a leadership change this year with **Andrea Crouch** becoming the new director in March 2019, replacing **Katharine Smith**. She has come twice to our monthly meetings and will continue to update us, serving as our new liaison. (**Sheila Breitweiser** served for several years as the liaison from the Day School Board to our committee until her board term ended in December 2018. Her dedication was very much appreciated.) The Day School has been challenged by under enrollment in the 3 year-old classroom. Both the Board and Andrea are working on this problem. We are pleased to report that First Presbyterian Day School has once again achieved its status as a 5-Star child development center, the highest NC day care rating.

<u>Racial Equity Committee</u> continues to provide educational options and guide the church in looking at where we fall short and where we'd like to be as a racially inclusive congregation. The "Becoming and an Anti-racist Church" Sunday school class was well attended and started some valuable discussions. Two movies "13^{th"} and "Slavery by Another Name" were shown at the church and in members' homes with time for discussion. FPC will be reading *Just Mercy* this summer in conjunction with Mindy's study of racial reconciliation on her sabbatical. Numerous additional educational programs are being planned.

<u>Mission trip and Day of Service</u>: The October 2018 Day of Service had 46 participants at five sites as well as \$4,600 donated for clean-up buckets that were distributed in New Bern after Hurricane Florence. The Day of Service in April 2019 had 52 participants at five sites. In June of 2018, an intergenerational group helped repair a house in Kinston damaged during Hurricane Matthew.

<u>Crop Walk</u> (April 2019) was organized very ably by **Jody Maxwell** and 22 FPC walkers had good fellowship and raised over \$2,750. Durham raised over \$94,000 with funds going to Church World Service's international programs and Durham hunger organizations.

<u>Walk-In Ministry</u> continues to be a very important ministry of the church. Skilled volunteers assist neighbors in need with in-person problem solving, prayer, rent/utility assistance, bus passes, medication assistance and blessing bags. Due to the Lenten Match they have increased the amount of financial assistance they offered over the past year. As a measure of how their work is respected in the community, Westminster Presbyterian Church contributed \$6,000 to the Walk-In Ministry for outreach in 2019.

<u>Prison Ministry</u> has been active this year. A small group continues to visit Orange County Correctional and support a recently released inmate. The Faith Support Team (organized through Religious Coalition for a Non-violent Durham- RCND) has had a good relationship with Omar who has stable employment, housing and hopes to soon start driving school for commercial vehicles. He has been making good decisions and working steadily towards his goals. A project between the City of Durham and RCND to give persons released from prison and returning to Durham a Welcome Home package started recently. The boxes are being stored at FPC until they are needed across the street at the Criminal Justice Resource Center and our congregation is one of several contributing supplies.

<u>Apartment proposal:</u> When the second-floor apartment became available in 2018 the Property Committee accepted proposals for its use. Service and Mission submitted a proposal that it be used by a justice-involved individual. Many details need to be worked out to make this proposal a reality including Property's concerns over landlord responsibilities. The Session approved a task force in February 2019 to look into the issues and logistics. The task force will continue to work through the issues to determine if this is a ministry the church can undertake.

<u>World Mission</u> efforts have focused on expanding the Mexican Justo Café sales. The Session retreat in February 2019 expressed desire to focus on the Durham community and the needs of the congregation, so for the short-term, we will focus on coffee sales and education about this border ministry and not more ambitious programing. Additionally, *Margaret and Miguel Rubiera* took a Habitat trip to Honduras in winter of 2019.

<u>Iglesia Emanuel</u> has faced growing fear and uncertainty this year with increased deportations and ICE activity. They have also strengthened their programing with *Miguel Rubiera* coordinating a new after school tutoring program. This compliments strong offerings for children in music and soccer. They had a very successful fund raiser in April 2019, raising over \$26,000.

<u>Immigration</u>: Several members are supporting local sanctuary churches that are hosting immigrants fighting deportation. Our **Christmas Concerns** offering went to support these immigrants.

<u>CAN</u> (Congregations, Associations and Neighborhoods) continued to address community needs, particularly affordable housing. Several FPC members are leaders in these efforts.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

Committee work focused on: (a) continuing the new approach to the stewardship campaign piloted in the prior year, (b) replicating the timeline ending the timeline before the end of year to enable the budget committee to establish a budget before the end of year, and c) following up on goals started in Year 1 of the Love in the Heart of Durham campaign.

Key activities:

- I. Continuation of new campaign approach year 2
 - Kick-off luncheon after Sunday service that was free for members.
 - Utilize various sources of media for campaign including web-based content, videos, etc.
 - Upgrade options for giving to accommodate multigenerational demographics.
 - Conduct home visit blitz during campaign to reach out to every person/family not receiving campaign materials during stewardship luncheon.
 - Perform training sessions for home visits.
 - Include as many members from session and diaconate to participate in home visits.
 - Participate in finance and budget committee meetings to align campaign messaging with church finances.
 - Develop strong campaign messages around church core values and mission.
 - Send stewardship message of thanksgiving and encouragement with each quarterly giving report.

II. Montreat Stewardship Renewal Conference

• **Cris Rivera, George Bernhardt, and Mindy Douglas** attended the first ever conference on stewardship sponsored by Montreat Conference Center. Joining a cohort of 14 congregations from all over the Southeast, we learned and fellowshipped on the topic of stewardship and ways to revitalize stagnating campaigns.

- We were encouraged by the feedback that our 2017campaign was well executed (narrative budget, clear goals, multi-stakeholder involvement, excitement) and from that feedback decided not to change anything process-wise for Year 2.
- Other learnings included the need to encourage Relationship Building and a yearround focus on developing stewardship leaders.

III. Gifts assessment survey

Another take-away from Montreat was the idea for a gifts assessment survey to replace the old time and talent cards. The idea was that these would 1)include more broad ideas about what individual gifts and passions were as oppose to a litany of things to check off, 2)be shepherded by Stewardship in order to make sure the information was going to be funneled to the appropriate committees efficiently. While we are still sold on the idea, because so few of these surveys were turned in (approximately 50), we will work on a new methods of executing in 2019.

IV. Campaign theme/goals/ materials selected

- Based on feedback from Montreat, we continued our theme "Love in the heart of Durham, Seeking the Welfare of the City." The same four themes were used: "Community," "inclusion," "social mission," "worship and Christian education."
- Campaign goals were again specifically tied to 3 budgetary goals that would allow our church to continue serving our community and maintaining our service missions. A target of 8% over the PY giving level would allow us to achieve our stated goals. Since we achieved one of our goals in Year 1 (develop a budget without dipping into reserves), our three goals for the campaign were (1) achieve pay equity for staff, (2) continue restoring budget cuts to service and mission committee, and (3) enhance ministries to children and their families.
- The brochure and other campaign materials were carried over to this year, edited by Cris, Brian and Mindy. Our brochure was shorter but still included a narrative budget with charts indicating how our church spends its annual operating budget. Personnel costs were allocated into programs in order to show the true value of our staff time. Next year we plan to do the same for Property, showing functional allocation of the church's physical space.

We can mail and redistribute as necessary. Our plan for the 2019 campaign is to have every member of the Stewardship Committee recruit five visitors, which will give us ample coverage. Also, only members that are currently pledging, or new members, will receive home visitation packets. All others will be mailed.

Results of 2018 campaign

No committee proposed budget was cut; neither was there an increase. Two of the three goals met with results of the annual campaign (personnel pay equity and youth and their families). Service and Mission only received increase from the global budget, but with other goals met, the plan is to focus on restoring the S&M in the next campaign.

We reached 92.84% of our goal which is almost a 5% increase over last years'

campaign. While this was lower than our goal, we have realized that there were several factors that were not taken into account when contemplating our goal. There were more new members in 2017 than in 2017. 2018 also saw a large number of returning pledges (folks that hadn't pledged in several years). We are still thrilled that the congregation increased their pledges overall for the second year in a row. Knowing there are only two ways to increase pledges (increase in pledge units and increase in pledge amounts), a more conservative budget goal will be set for next year.

Campaign not fully completed before end of year. In 2017, there was a much more concerted effort to follow-up with lagging responses in the months following Dedication Sunday. Plans are in place to follow-up in November and December of 2019 so the budget committee will have firm numbers by the beginning of the year.

To follow-up with our plans for Year-Round Stewardship, the committee has continued to meet in the late winter and spring, while the Legacy Society is in full swing. Quarterly statements will contain reminders of year-round stewardship, as well as thank-yous and impact stories. Seasonal focuses will be:

Winter – Stewardship of the Future (Legacy Society, wills, estate planning, including Sunday School class and annual thank-you luncheon)
Spring – Stewardship of creation (activities, sermons)
Summer – Stewardship of Time and talent (focus on education, financial literacy, "What is Stewardship" Sunday school)
Fall – Stewardship of Treasure (annual stewardship commitment/pledging)

Worship: The committee prepares the sanctuary for worship each Sunday and for special occasions at other times during the year such as md-week services during Advent as well as for two well attended separate Candle Light and Easter services. The Paschal Candle is maintained by our committee. It is always lit for funerals, baptisms and all the Sundays during our celebration of Eastertide.

Communion: On a rotating basis, members of the committee prepare the elements for all communion services, at which regular and gluten free breads are always available.

Flowers: Flower donation schedule is maintained by *Jean Wilson* and *Ruth Roberson*. We may use the **Tyren Fund** on occasion if a donor is unavailable. *Alice Raney* is in charge of providing the Advent Wreath, Poinsettias, Palm fronds and Easter Lilies.

Music: Our Minister of Music, *Kathy Parkins*, directs all musical events. Our first Composer in Residence was *James Biery*. The *SONAM* concert was in January, 2019, The *Horst and Mary Ruth Meyer Endowment* provided funding for an exceptional concert with our FPC choir and the St. Phillips Episcopal Church choir. Art: Quilt Exhibit – Members of FPC exhibited beautiful handmade quilts in Watts Hill Hall hung by members of the WATA Committee. Iris Folding creations beautifully crafted by *Hendrika Vande Kemp* also adorned the walls of Watts Hill Hall.

McPherson Lectureship: *Mary Louise Bringle*, Professor of Philosophy and Religious Studies at Brevard College was our guest lecturer this year.

Meyer Endowment: A subcommittee has been formed with *Kathy Parkins* as liaison.

Informational Brochures: Guided by the Committee, Mary Berry revised and improved existing versions on the *Witness to the Resurrection* adopted in 2004 and on the **Sacrament of Baptism** adopted in 1994. Revision of the latter had been led by *M. Henderson Rourk* following liturgical changes inspired by the 1993 publication of the Book of Common Worship. *Mary Berry's* skillful revisions, clearly addressed to the interested parties, presented the procedures to be followed, the symbolic roles of various elements of the services including that of the Paschal Candle dedicated in 2017. Presbyterian Women is an organization within First Presbyterian Church, New Hope Presbytery, Synod of the Mid Atlantic, and General Assembly Council. We contribute to the life and mission of the congregation, the community, and the world mission of the First Presbyterian Church, using our talents, skills, knowledge, and monetary gifts to spread the love of Jesus Christ to those we can, help build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthen the Presbyterian Church (USA), and witnesses to the promises of God's kingdom.

The Circle meets on the first Monday of the month (unless rescheduled for holidays) at the church. It is a source of fellowship and support for members, especially as we study together from the Horizon Bible Study curriculum. This past year we studied "God's Promise" led by *Rev. Susan Dunlap*. Our meetings start with light refreshments and social time, followed by a brief business report and the Bible study. Our average attendance is 18.

We collect two offerings: **Least Coin** for causes selected by The International Committee for the Fellowship of Least Coin, to support programs that work for justice, peace and reconciliation throughout the world. The **Blessing Box** is used for individual Circle projects such as contributions to *Share the Warmth fund*, *Church World Service (blankets)*, *FPC Christmas Concerns*, and gifts to homebound members.

In addition, members pledge to the local Presbyterian Women's budget. This allows us to support *Meals on Wheels, Families Moving Forward, Children's Hope Alliance,* and *Urban Ministries of Durham*. We also make baby quilts which are given at baptisms and sent to Honduras with a Habitat mission group led by *Margaret and Miguel Rubiera*. This year, we purchased Bibles for Susan Dunlap to use at Urban Ministries and New Testaments for the church's Walk-in Ministry. We also collected warm clothing for Urban Ministries. At each monthly Circle meeting, 15-20 cards are brought by *Marg Ann Ruegg*, outreach chairperson, for members to sign. The cards are then mailed out or delivered by Circle members to shut-ins.

We thank those who lead and support Presbyterian Women. Your devotion and faithfulness keep us strong. Women of all ages are invited to join us as we continue to serve Jesus Christ, and we pray for God's guidance in meeting the needs of our church, community, and the world.

FINANCE AND INVESTMENT COMMITTEE AND TREASURER

1. Introduction

The Finance and Investment (F&I) Committee is charged with overseeing the financial accounts of the Church, overseeing its investments, developing an annual budget for approval by the Session, and ensuring an annual audit of Church funds by outside accountants. Key points about these responsibilities over the last year, as described by subcommittee chairpersons and the Treasurer, are in the sections 3-5 of this report. In addition, the F&I Committee works in conjunction with Stewardship Committee and, of course, it reports to the Session on all of these financial matters.

The Treasurer, who is elected by the Board of Trustees, oversees the financial transactions of the Church. Among other things, he reviews the disbursements and the accounting for the transactions, and he works with the Business Administrator to produce the financial reports. He is also a member of the Finance and Investment Committee.

2. Finance and Investment Committee

The members and staff during this reporting period were *Torrell Armstrong*, *Al Arrowood* (chair for 2018), *George Bernhardt*, *Tom Bloom*, *Doug Butler*, *Carol Carson* (chair for 2019), *Mindy Douglas*, *Tom Keller*, Karen Romines, *Sam Miglarese*, and *Ed Pritchett*.

The Committee met almost monthly in carrying out its duties. Each month it received the financial statements. As in past years, the budget was well controlled, thanks in large part to the careful attention to their budgets by the various committees. Each quarter it heard from the Investment Subcommittee about the investment portfolio. The Committee is aware that investment performance needs to be assessed over a period of time (e.g., a full cycle), but watched closely the performance of the Investment Manager engaged two years ago. It received updates from the Budget Subcommittee as it worked its way to a proposal. Note was taken at the time the budget proposal was discussed that it does not cover capital costs associated with the Christian Education building, such as the HVAC system and roof replacement, that are expected in the near future. From time to time requests for nonbudgeted spending were considered, including some from committees for spending not covered by their budget and some not falling within a committee's purview.

Work was begun on a policy about carry over to a future year of the annual endowment distributions. The current practice has been that funds from an allowable distribution that are not spent within the year of the allocation are left with the endowment. Questions were arising about that policy, and consideration is being given to how, in a transparent way, to recognize that some flexibility is needed while maintaining the agreements under which the endowments were established.

3. Investment Subcommittee

Investment Subcommittee members and staff included *Torrell Armstrong*, *Doug Butler*, *Carol Carson*, *Sam Miglarese*, *Ed Pritchett*, and *Al Arrowood* (Chair). *Bob Breitweiser* rotated off the committee during the year.

The Subcommittee met once per calendar quarter to review the performance of the portfolio with our Investment Manager, U.S. Trust. The Investment Manager reviewed the overall market performance and compared our portfolio performance to the custom FPC benchmark. For the last reported year our portfolio increased by 5.49%; this is 1.07% under the FPC custom benchmark. During the year the Subcommittee considered and then implemented procedures for an early estimate (in June) and calculation (in September) of the distributions from the endowments, the former intended to give committees that receive the distributions a figure to help them budget. As the reporting year drew to a close the Subcommittee began work on the review of the Consolidated Statement of Investment Policy.

4. Budget Subcommittee

The Budget Subcommittee was composed of leaders from the three committees that comprise the bulk of Church budget (Property, Personnel, and Service and Mission), Stewardship Committee leaders, and members from the Finance Committee.

The Subcommittee began work on the 2019 budget in the summer of 2018 and, after a number of meetings, proposed a budget to session with three priorities. The Stewardship Committee conducted a great campaign, and thanks to the generous response of the congregation, we were able to fully fund two of the three goals in the 2019 budget. The first goal, which is not a new goal, was to continue addressing disparities in our compensation practices. About 3 years ago, we realized some staff who have been at FPC for several years were being paid on a scale significantly lower than newer hires. Specifically, the positions that were out of alignment were the Associate Pastor and the Minister of Music. In the 2018 budget, we had been able to get both of those positions about halfway to target compensation levels, as identified by the Personnel Committee. In the 2019 budget, this work was completed, and the two positions were brought up to target levels. In addition, the rest of the staff received a modest cost-of-living adjustment.

The second goal was a new one for 2019. We wanted to enhance our youth and children's program by hiring a full-time, ordained Associate Pastor for Youth and Their Families. This goal was fully funded in the 2019 budget. *John Weicher* has been filling this position on a temporary contract since August 2018, and a search committee is looking for a permanent hire.

The third goal also is not new: to restore our Service and Mission budget to its historic levels. Although we had made some great progress on that goal last year, we were not able to further address it this year. We wrestled with the balance of these three goals, and this decision was made after a lot of very thoughtful discussion. We are hopeful that addressing our personnel budget issues this year will allow us to focus on Service and Mission in the coming years. Submitted by *Karen Romines*

5. Annual Audit

Each year the Church engages an independent auditor to examine the financial statements to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the statements are free of material misstatement. The firm **Bernard Robinson & Company, L.L.P**., conducted the audit for the year ending December 31, 2017, and reported to the F&I Committee in June 2018. In general, there were no surprises. Again the opinion was qualified because FPC does not report expenses by their functional classification, as is required under professional accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The auditor also identified an opportunity to strengthen internal controls, which, subsequently, was acted upon.

The same firm conducted the audit for the year ending December 31, 2018. The report from that audit was not yet available at the end of May, as this report was being completed. The report will in its presentation of status and activity reflect the new accounting standards for organizations such as the Church. After the auditor's report to the F&I Committee, expected in July, the Committee plans to prepare a report for the Session on the financial status and activities for the year ending December 31, 2018, with the expectation that a summary will be made available to the congregation.

6. Ad hoc Gift Policy Committee

Early in the reporting year, *Cris Rivera*, as chair of the ad hoc Committee, sent to Committee members the various sections of the draft policy of 2015 (never approved by the Session) formatted into a proposed "ideal" structure for such a policy. The next step was to have members take a section, review it, and add content as needed. A couple of sections were completed; several are in limbo. As the reporting year closed, discussion was underway about how to re-energize the effort.

7. Closing

It is with gratitude for the resources available to carry out the FPC's mission and continuing commitment to be good stewards of those resources that we submit this report.
